President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is Delivering in Arizona

As of July 2022

The Biden-Harris Administration has hit the ground running to implement the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, and it is already delivering results for the people of Arizona. To date, \$1.9 billion in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding has been announced and is headed to Arizona with over 80 specific projects identified for funding. This year alone, Arizona will receive more than \$1.3 billion for transportation to invest in roads, bridges, public transit, ports and airports and over \$109 million for clean water. And, as of today, more than 284,000 households across the state are receiving affordable internet due to the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Many more projects will be added in the coming months, as funding opportunities become grant awards and as formula funds become specific projects. By reaching communities all across Arizona – including rural communities and historically underserved populations – the law makes critical investments that will improve lives for Arizonans and position the state for success.

Roads and Bridges: In Arizona there are 132 bridges and over 3,193 miles of highway in poor condition. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will rebuild our roads and includes the single largest dedicated bridge investment since the construction of the interstate highway system. Based on formula funding alone, Arizona is expected to receive approximately \$5.3 billion over five years in federal funding for highways and bridges.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, Arizona has been allocated \$969 million in highway formula funding and \$45 million in dedicated funding for bridges in 2022.

Internet: High-speed internet is necessary for Americans to do their jobs, participate in school, access health care, and stay connected. Yet nearly 22% of Arizonans do not have an internet subscription. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$65 billion to provide affordable, high-speed internet to every American. Arizona will receive a minimum allocation of at least \$100 million to help ensure high-speed internet coverage across the state. Additionally, experts estimate that as many as 1,075,000 households

in Arizona are eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program, which cuts internet bills by up to \$30 per month, or \$75 for households on Tribal lands, and provides a one-time \$100 discount off a connected device. The Biden-Harris Administration is providing further cost savings by working with internet providers to offer high-speed internet plans that are fully covered by the Affordable Connectivity Program — meaning most eligible households can now get high-speed internet without paying a dime.

- **Progress to date:** About 284,000 households in Arizona are enrolled in the Affordable Connectivity Program, with more signing up every day. Households can check their eligibility, sign up, and find fully covered internet plans at [GetInternet.gov](https://www.getinternet.gov).

Water: Currently, up to 10 million American households across the country connect to water through lead pipes and lack access to clean, safe drinking water. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law represents the largest investment in clean drinking water in American history, including the first-ever dedicated federal funding to replace lead service lines and address dangerous PFAS chemicals.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, over \$109 million is available in fiscal year 2022 to provide clean and safe water across the state. Of this funding, \$51 million is dedicated to lead pipe and service line replacement, with another \$32 million for safe drinking water investments that can also support lead pipe replacement in fiscal year 2022.

Public Transit: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law makes the largest investment in public transit in U.S. history. Based on formula funding alone, Arizona would expect to receive more than \$900 million over five years under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to improve public transit across the state.¹ This funding will expand healthy, sustainable transportation options in Arizona, where non-white households are 2 times more likely to commute via public transportation.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, Arizona has been allocated \$175 million to improve public transportation options across the state in fiscal year 2022.

Electric Vehicle Charging: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$7.5 billion to build the first-ever national network of electric vehicle chargers in the United States and is a critical element of President Biden's plan to address the climate crisis and support domestic manufacturing jobs. Through the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Program alone, Arizona should expect to receive more than \$76 million in formula funding over five years to support the expansion of electric vehicle charging in the state.

- **Announced funding to date:** Arizona has been allocated \$11 million in 2022, pending the approval of the state's Electric Vehicle Charging Plan.

Clean Energy & Power: Power outages cost the U.S. economy more than \$70 billion annually. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law makes a historic investment to upgrade our power infrastructure by making the grid more resilient and building thousands of miles of new transmission lines to deliver clean, affordable electricity. The law also makes a historic investment in clean energy technologies like advanced nuclear, clean hydrogen, and carbon capture, as well as a historic \$3.5 billion investment in weatherization to improve energy efficiency of homes and lower energy costs for impacted households by an average of \$372 per year.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, approximately \$48 million has been allocated to Arizona in 2022 for weatherization and \$6.7 million to help prevent outages and make the power grid more resilient in 2022. Additional grid funding will be made available in the coming months.

Airports & Ports: According to some rankings, no U.S. airports rank in the top 25 of airports worldwide. Our ports and waterways are in need of repair and reimagination too. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$17 billion in port infrastructure and \$25 billion in airports to strengthen our supply chains, address maintenance backlogs, and reduce congestion and emissions near ports and airports – ultimately helping our country move goods and people more quickly and at lower cost.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, Arizona has received about \$84 million in 2022 for airports and \$935,000 in 2022 for ports.

Resilience: Millions of Americans feel the effects of climate change and extreme weather every day. More frequent hurricanes, wildfires, heat waves, floods, unprecedented power outages, and persistent droughts devastate our communities and threaten our infrastructure. In the last two decades, Arizona has experienced 27 extreme weather events, costing the state up to \$10 billion in damages. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law makes a \$50 billion investment to bolster our resilience against pressing challenges like impacts of climate change, extreme weather events, and other hazards like cyberattacks.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, approximately \$112 million has been allocated to Arizona for infrastructure resilience in 2022.

Legacy Pollution Cleanup: Across the country, thousands of former industrial, chemical, and energy sites emit harmful pollutants into surrounding communities. These sites pose harms to health, welfare, and economic prosperity — and disproportionately impact communities of color: 26% of Black Americans and 29% of Hispanic Americans live within 3 miles of a Superfund site, a higher percentage than for Americans

overall. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will deliver the largest investment in tackling legacy pollution in American history by cleaning up Superfund and brownfield sites, reclaiming abandoned mines, and capping orphaned oil and gas wells.

- **Announced funding to date:** To date, more than \$26 million has been allocated to Arizona in 2022 for legacy pollution cleanup, such as capping orphaned oil and gas wells and reclaiming abandoned mine lands.

ARIZONA PROJECT SPOTLIGHTS

Ports of Entry Project Spotlight

Arizona Ports of Entry

Overview: The General Services Administration has committed more than \$500 million to three Arizona ports of entry, projects that will strengthen supply chains, create jobs, and enhance security and trade. The projects include more than \$200 million for a new commercial port in Douglas to better facilitate the crossing of commercial goods, \$115 million to complete the modernization of San Luis Port of Entry, an important port for the U.S. food industry and related supply chains, and \$200 million for modernization of the existing Raul Hector Castro Port in Douglas.

Airport Project Spotlight

Phoenix-Mesa Gateway Airport Expansion and Upgrades

Overview: The Federal Aviation Administration awarded \$14.4 million to modernize the Phoenix-Mesa Gateway Airport. The project will expand and upgrade the terminal, improving the traveling experience for passengers, and replace a temporary four-gate facility with a permanent five-gate facility that will be accessible for passengers with disabilities.

Resilience Project Spotlight

Flood Risk Reduction along Little Colorado River

Overview: The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers awarded \$65.7 million to reduce flood risks along the Little Colorado River in Winslow, Navajo County. Currently, about 5,000 people live and work within the flood plain and are at potential risk of flooding, as well as critical infrastructure like hospitals and schools.

Overview: Arizona will receive \$82 million from the Department of the Interior for drought resilience projects through the aging infrastructure program, focused in the Yuma area.

Wildfire Prevention Project Spotlight

Wildfire Risk Reduction in Four National Forests

Overview: The Department of Agriculture has committed \$12 million to reducing wildfire risk across the Kaibab, Coconino, Apache-Sitgreaves, and Tonto National Forests, which include some of the highest-risk wildfire areas in Arizona. The project will restore the forest ecosystem, reduce the threat of destructive wildfire to local communities, and support sustainable forest industries that strengthen local economies. It aims to impact 100,000 acres in FY22.
